On the Budget

We will be discussing and then voting on the budget for 2017-18 during June, and our decisions are nothing less than the future of St Paul.

We need everyone participating. It's also important to know that a budget is not just income and expenses, it is a statement about our ministry, about where we want our money to be used for the mission of the church, our core values. Our income is finite and St Paul can no longer operate on the expectation that a "windfall" will come along and save the church. So we are going to have to make hard decisions on where to spend our financial resources: outreach, property, music, evangelism, education? Please join the conversation.

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A Service of Healing and Reconciliation will be part of our worship on June 4. It will finish the conversations we've been having on our history, and as those who have participated know there has been much pain both given and received. So we are going to put our prayers for forgiveness and our prayers of forgiveness on small pieces of paper and at the close of the service process out to the Columbarium and burn those papers and "let our prayers rise like incense." If you are in contact with any of the members we seldom see, please invite them to this service that they too might hear the words of absolution and healing.

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Worship Notes: The season of Pentecost begins June 18, this is a season of Ordinary time. The altar color will change to green, and we will return to using the Processional Crucifix, but the decision of the Worship and Music team was to leave the gold cross on the back altar. Please talk with Carolyn Bolden, Pastor Penni or Fr Don if you have comments.

Highlights from the May meeting of St. Paul's congregational council

Pastor's Report:

- Doors Open Denver was a great success with over 250 people coming in.
- Action Item: Pastor Penni met with the pastors of Messiah and Our Savior along with Pr. Judith VanOsdol to begin the dialogue with all three congregations. The Transition Team, the Executive Council, and representatives from the other two churches will meet together on June 10. We are compiling an agenda.
- Transition Team Update: The Core Values Conversations coming up need research on our surrounding community, including businesses, street closures, churches, demographics, etc. We need volunteers to help with the research.

Father Don's Report: Bishop Gonia will speak after mass on May 13 on church structure and possibilities for a clearer statement on the relationship of the two congregations.

Cantor's Report: Mark handed out a detailed plan about the position of Music Director. Aaron will work out the finances of these plans as soon as possible.

Treasurer's Report: (see budget discussion under New Business).

Old Business Updates:

- Pledge cards for the Stewardship campaign have gone out in time for Consecration Weekend May 20 and 21.
- Parking spaces for rent in the garage are still being explored. It was moved and seconded that we gather facts of our options as soon as possible since this impacts our budget. Motion accepted.
- Street Reach: Fr. Don met with Ian and Kathleen a second time and reached an agreement on many of the suggestions from St. Paul; Ian and Kathleen agreed the system is working better.

New Business:

- Constitutional Amendments: Moved and seconded that Council submit the 32 amendments necessary for compliance with the ELCA as a body at the Congregational Meeting. Passed.
- Maintenance Concerns: The flooding caused

considerable damage to our office carpets, the roof tiles, etc. Jeff will work with our insurance agent.

- Budget Proposal for fiscal year of July 1, 2017 to June 30, 2018 – Aaron distributed the budget proposal that had been accepted by the Executive Council. The goal was to come as close as possible to a balanced budget.
- The Budget will be the only item on the June 13 Council Meeting as it needs to be presented at the June 25 Congregational Annual Meeting.
- The budget will be discussed at Adult Forums on June 4th and 11th.
- What is the lowest amount in cash savings that we are comfortable with?
- Much discussion followed on the Music Program, which is unsustainable at present levels.

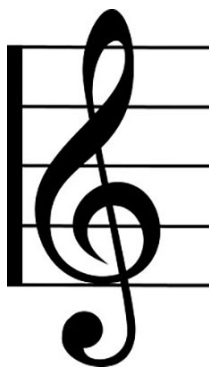

The Wit of Martin Luther



In 1542, Luther's constant adversary, Archbishop Albrecht of Mainz, decided to display his vast collection of holy relics. Just gazing upon them piously granted the penitents an Indulgence. Luther decided to mock the practice rather than to rail against it. He wrote an anonymous pamphlet, later admitting to its authorship, listing some of the marvels that could be viewed:

- Three flames from the burning bush on Mt. Sinai
- Two feathers and an egg from the Holy Spirit (*aha! So she is female!*)
- One half of the Archangel Gabriel's wing
- A large heavy piece of the shout with which the children of Israel tumbled the walls of Jericho
- A large lock of Beelzebub's beard
- A nice section of Moses' left horn
