St. Paul Council Highlights for October 2017

Staff and Officer Reports:

Pastor Penni's Report was distributed:

- Prayer Vine is established. Pastor Penni and Father Don will pass along prayer requests.
- Sound System Work with Wave Sound is progressing. It may be possible to aim the speaker above the Chancel to improve sound to the congregation below rather than to the balcony. Mike will investigate that this week. (Subsequent to Council Meeting, Mike did indeed re-aim the speaker with very good results.)
- Microphone Upgrades are still under consideration. There is a low cost, short term option and a replacement option with new equipment. We can perform the system tuning the week in October 23rd in time for Reformation Sunday.
- Picture Directory: postponed for now. We will continue with our directory update.
- Blessing of the Animals: We should continue this as we did get several walk-ins on Sunday and a good number of pets on Saturday.
- Newborns in Need Baby Shower Event: Maryann received a Thrivent Action Team approval to proceed with the kick-off event at Our Savior on Saturday, Nov. 11. We need a couple of volunteers to help. Messiah and Our Savior are invited to the event.
- Tri-Church News: Next meeting will be in January because pastoral changes for all three congregations are in the works. St. Paul was invited to attend Our Savior on Thanksgiving Eve for worship and pie. All three churches are interested in a Santa Lucia Event in December at St. Paul.
- Transition Team / Call Committee: The Transition Team finalized a Vision Statement and has proposed a new name – St. Paul Church: A Lutheran and Catholic Community. We hope to approve names for the Call

Committee by email after the October 22nd church meeting.

- Music at St. Paul: We need a fee structure for groups wishing to rent concert space. After discussion, we approved the following fees:
 - o \$600 – includes the concert event and a rehearsal
 - o \$350 of the fee goes to the concert coordinator
 - o \$250 of the fee goes to St. Paul
- Bylaws and Constitutions for both parts of the St. Paul Community are underway.
- There is an Intent to Spend form for all monies over \$100, which is available from the office and soon on the website.

Father Don's Report:

- The new bylaws for the ECC (Ecumenical Catholic Communion) should be simple and similar to the new Lutheran bylaws. Pax Christi Bylaws might be a guide.
- Members and clergy of local ECC churches will worship with us on Reformation Sunday, as will members of Messiah.

Treasurer's Report postponed till next Council meeting.

Committee Reports:

Building and Grounds:

- The hot water system is broken, and we're getting estimates. Street Reach has offered to help with the costs.
- Columbarium needs repairs. We're getting advice on these repairs as well.

Worship committee had a good meeting with lots of good plans.

Education programs are planned until the end

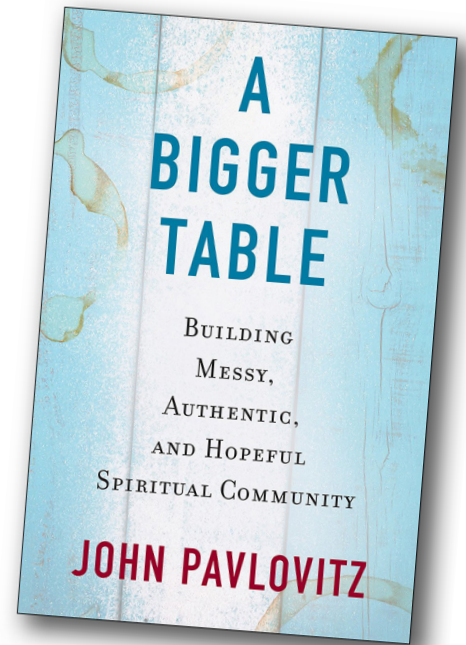
Adult Forum for Autumn A Bigger Table

- Money to safe – Assisting Ministers need to be reminded to take the money down to the safe.

New Business Updates:

- Feasts – Irene will form a committee to look into reviving the Supper Club outings
- A rummage sale will be held, perhaps in the

courtyard in May.

- Epiphany Dinner – Lori Eastman is working on a Fundraiser for the Foundation with a dinner to honor three Wise Women of St. Paul: Dorothy Stenman, Jan Miller, and Denise.
- The semi-annual Congregational Meeting will be held on Sunday, December 10. Lori Eastman will form a nominating committee to find at least one person to replace Mike Wallin, outgoing.
- Moved and seconded that we refer the name St. Paul Church: A Lutheran and Catholic Community to the congregation at the December 10th meeting.

Approved unanimously.

Father Don offered a closing prayer. Our next Council Meeting will be held on November 14.

Synod Seeks People to Accompany Migrant Children

Volunteers are needed for the ELCA Guardian Angel Program for Unaccompanied and Migrant Children.

This program provides spiritual and physical accompaniment of unaccompanied migrant children and families through their immigration court process.

Volunteers will accompany unaccompanied minors and migrant children through the immigration court system. I have signed up to participate. Once enough volunteers sign up, the ELCA office will send someone to train us. Spanish language proficiency is not necessary for all volunteers -

some of us who have signed up do speak Spanish. Pastor Alena Lamirato of the Rocky Mountain Synod is organizing the program for our region. We need five more volunteers to proceed with the training that will be scheduled in early 2018.

Greetings from Rwanda

Ryan Campbell has been attending services at St. Paul, but this August he left Denver for Africa, serving in Rwanda for a year through the ELCA's Young Adults in Global Mission volunteer program. Eighty-five young people will be serving in 11 different countries, working in churches, schools and social service ministries.

Here is an update from Ryan:

Mondays and Wednesdays I work as a classroom supplement to English classes at a primary school, Child Care Academy. There I help with English listening, speaking, and comprehension. I work with grades: 2,3,4, and 5. I enjoy the teachers there a lot. I often eat meals with them. The first is a breakfast. Although, it's more of a 'morning tea.' Taken at 10 am, it consists of porridge, (which you drink instead of eat!) and a roll. Then at 12-2, it's lunch. They eat lunch with the students in a classroom. It's quite nice to sit on these tiny chairs and make faces with shy or excited students. It's pretty consistently rice and beans in a sauce, if we're lucky, with small fish the size of minnows or anchovies. On Wednesdays, after lunch, the students go home and the teachers stay to work. I teach a beginner's and advanced computer class. The school has 2 computers, a printer, and photocopier. The teachers have varying degrees of computer fluency. A lot of exams are hand written then photocopied. Some are printed.

Tuesdays and Thursdays I work at the other school, St. Matthews-a nursery, primary school, and Jr. high. Since we're close to the end of the term, I'm helping

them to type exams. They have one computer for each: Primary and Secondary grades. I also take morning porridge with them, around the same time, although this is more of a working tea time. Sometimes I take lunch with them-similar fare, and sometimes I'll finish early and go home for lunch.

Thursdays in the evening, I teach a small class of a court employees including a judge. It's an hour, to an hour-and-half. I teach English with the Bible as my primary textbook. All of them are over 30 years old and all have families. They are a fun group to work with, and I always look forward to meeting with them. I even was invited to one of their children's birthday celebrations!

Saturdays, after the Bible school, I help teach English to a small group of students in a range of ages. We have been working through a kids book a little at a time. Worship is pretty similar to a Lutheran service back home. There's a children's choir, with a drum pictured and they sound very good! There's church

announcements, prayers of the people, greeting each other, hymnals from a green Kinyarwanda hymn book — the Green Book, I call it, versus the Blue book of American fame. We read the weekly scripture verses set out in advance. There's a sermon, sometimes translated for me, and more hymns, an offering. Then we walk out in song

together, and greet each other. In and out in 2-3 hours, depending on the service.



Kamembe Church

The big news is that the Kamembe Parish here is planning to build a new church. The space we have is currently rented, small, and difficult to network being a temporary location. Physical

space-permanent physical space is very important culturally to the Church in Rwanda. There's a pride, and logistical aspect to having your own address, your own building. The church will be called St. Luther Kamembe Parish Church. The aim is that it will be an anchor for the congregation here to grow, and support the surrounding region, being the only Lutheran establishment for several hours (the nearest is Huye). They are also planning to hold a bible camp for elementary students here in December. I am looking forward to it a lot, having helped in one or two growing up.

As you read this, please feel free to reach out and let me know how I can pray for you, your family, or your community. I am honored at the opportunity.
