Happy Year to all! 2017 was a busy, exciting and fruitful year and I am expecting 2018 will bring many new and wondrous experiences for St Paul.

We installed the Call Committee December 16 and 17, they are:

They will begin meeting in early January, choosing a chairperson and a secretary. I will work with the call committee during this process but will step out when the interview process begins. Their first task will be filling out the rest of the Ministry Site Profile. This is the main document that will go to all candidates and the ELCA churchwide. The Transition Team did the first two parts; the remaining three parts are the call committee's responsibility. This part of their job will likely take one to two months and will involve talking with members in small groups. When finished, it is approved by the Bishop and is the trigger for us to start receiving the names of candidates.

The call committee will then review and choose two to four candidates for live interviews, narrowing down to two. Those

final two will be invited to in person interviews. A final choice will be presented to the Church Council, then voted on by the whole congregation. The candidate will make the final acceptance. This part of the process can take one to three months. This is not the time to rush to a choice — slow is better than wrong. I will stay until you have a confirmed pastor.

The call committee will communicate with the congregation regularly, but feel free to talk to any of the team. They will not be able to disclose any names until they finalize a candidate.

Please keep these people in your prayers during the upcoming months.

Two Congregational Meetings to Help Set Direction of Church

Two important congregational meetings are coming up.

January 14, noon: Conversation on the Constitution and Bylaws, including a discussion on House for All Sinners and Saints (see below).

Feb 11, noon: Semi-annual meeting – Council elections and voting on the constitution and bylaws.

The church council is requesting nominations for two council positions. First, chair of the Property Team. This person would present the needs for the upkeep of our historic building at the monthly church council meetings and would also chair a team of members who would make recommendations regarding needs, budgets, potential vendors and contracts. Second, chair of the Worship and Music Team. This position would be working with a team of members to make decisions about all the elements that go into our worship.

Please speak to or email any of the following for further information: Father Don, Pastor Penni, Jeff Parrott, or Lori Eastman, chair of the nominating committee. The committee welcomes self-nominations, but is also interested in suggestions from members of both the Lutheran and Catholic communities regarding these leadership positions.

House for All Sinners and Saints

House for all Sinners and Saints has expressed an interest to move to St Paul. The Council is considering the idea and will keep the congregation informed as we move along. A final decision will not be made without input from the Congregation.

A part of the proposal is to replace some or all of the pews with wooden, style appropriate chairs, which House will pay for along with regular rent. The dollar figure on that is up for negotiations, but they are currently paying \$10,000 annually for their space.

It is a big opportunity so you are all asked to prayerfully consider what this could mean for St Paul.

Sanctuary Discussion

Summary of December 17 Meeting

This was a meeting to cover the status of the Transition Committee and its final report and to inform the congregation of upcoming activities to call a new pastor.

As part of the meeting, I gave an update on recent meetings regarding the possibility of setting up a Sanctuary location at a local church. Pastor Penni asked that I start the meeting to make sure as many people hear the information as possible.

I covered some of the interested parties that have started to become involved in this effort. St. Paul, Epiphany and House for All Sinners and Saints (HFASS) had met informally to assess interest in the Sanctuary process. At an early December meeting an individual from Mountain View Friends near DU joined our informal group. Mountain View Friends has offered Sanctuary in the past, but renovations make that difficult now.

Josh Stallings, a member of HFASS, who has been involved in the Metro Denver Sanctuary Coalition, was meeting today with Belong United Methodist at 16th and Ogden to generate interest with that group. Temple Micah and Park Hill United Methodist also have a sanctuary operation run jointly by the two congregations housed in the same facility.

I pointed out that there are five persons in sanctuary in Colorado – which is one out of every six people in known sanctuary in the U.S.

I covered some of the frequently asked questions from an ACLU guide on Sanctuary and passed out an abbreviated version of the questions. (Both documents are in the files section of the Central Denver Sanctuary group. Go to <https://groups.io/g/CentralDenverSanctuary> to see these documents and/or to join the group.

I explained that we are in the early stages of discussion as to whether we can help support a Sanctuary location or provide a Sanctuary location with the help of area congregations.

There were many questions from the group:

Do we have the facilities? Yes, there is space in the Sunday school area and a shower can be made available in the family rest room.

What about furniture? Pastor Penni said Lutheran Refugee services has an excess of furniture because immigration has slowed.

Do we have to be with the person at all times? Yes, the office can cover during the day, but volunteers at other times?

Is there support for the person seeking sanctuary from other organizations? Yes, but we would help facilitate.

Is there synod support? Yes, there is a Rocky Mountain advocate aware of our work.

There were various other questions that I may have missed.

A member of the church council suggested that we vote on proceeding. My comment was that we are only in the early stages of investigating the possibilities. She suggested a straw vote to assess the interest and to insure that we should proceed. The vote was close to unanimous (one person may have raised their hand in opposition).

Carolyn Swenson and Judy Strasen expressed interest after the meeting.

It appears that St. Paul will proceed with discussions and will seek to work with other congregations on this possibility.

Christmas Eve Worship was engaging, fun and welcoming for everyone attending. The late services started with a hammered dulcimer prelude, performed by Lucille Reilly, that brought back memories for some and introduced others to a new musical genre. The wonderful voices of the choir quartet carried us on a musical journey of different kinds of carols, accompanied by Reilly on autoharp and recorder, by Ruth Barnham on piano and Cantor Mark Filbert on piano and organ.

Pastor Penni and Father Don

shared a dialog of their views of what Christmas means from both liturgical and secular perspectives and created some light and entertaining moments in the process as they described what an imperfectly perfect time it was and still is in the real world. There were children's church sessions with Pastor Penni, who shared some wonderful gifts wrapped in imperfect paper delivered in a most unexpected and ordinary looking box. Father Don shared the story of one of his infamous Monday morning phone calls from the bishop after he learned that Father Don had pointed out during



a Christmas Eve service that Jesus had NOT been born on December 25.

During the 7 p.m. worship, Father Don took advantage of a very young child's presence to illustrate a point about God's choice of an infant to bring love to the Earth and



pointed out that even though he (Father Don) had just met this baby a few minutes prior, she was showing that she felt safe and secure in his arms and was quiet and looking around at everyone. He also pointed out that while babies are sometimes messy, noisy, and demanding, everyone loves babies and are drawn to them much as we are drawn to God through Jesus.

There was a feeling of anticipation and love present during the worship times and all were welcomed with joy.






