Thank you to each and every one for your amazing contributions!

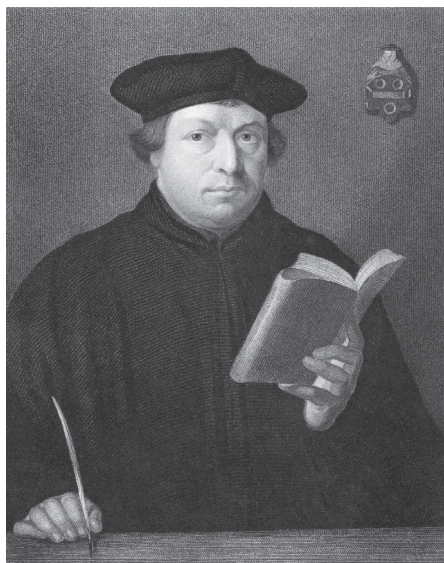

New Eyes on the Catechism

Quick! Recite the Ten Commandments. Which Creed is explained in the Catechism? If, like many of us, you’ve gotten a little rusty since you were confirmed at age 13, come for a refresher in February. More than a refresher. See the Catechism with New Eyes.

What does it mean not to bear false witness against our neighbor? Are we always to speak well of him/her (even if we know them to be cruel, demeaning, misogynistic, homophobic, etc.)? Does our theology bias us to be too quick to forgive and not condemn? Is this pattern repeated across all our churches because Christians emphasize forgiveness more than accountability? How can



we be charitable about those in power in Washington? And all these questions are about only one of the Commandments!

If the present series of Heaven, Hell, and the Hereafter is anything to go by, we will have many lively discussions as Pastor Barbara leads us through Luther’s Small Catechism. Booklets will be provided if you need one. The five-week series begins on February 3 and ends on March 3. Everyone is welcome.

Congregational Council Highlights • Jan. 8, 2019

Pastor Barbara Berry-Bailey's Report

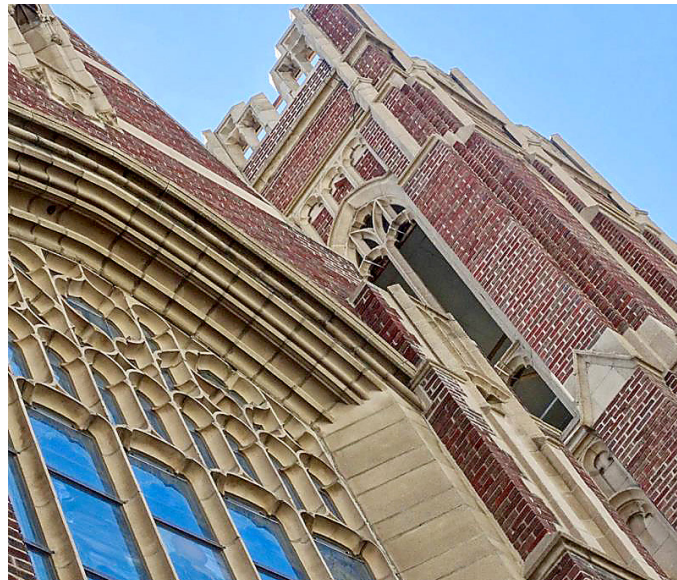
- The Council retreat will take place on Saturday, February 9, from 8:30 am to 3:30 pm at the Synod Offices.
- Lutheran Day at the Legislature will be held at St. Paul on February 21 at 7:30 am. Bishop Gonia will give a welcome before the training, and the day will conclude with a walk to the Capitol at 11:30 to meet the legislators.
- We would like to send a mailing to the new residents of nearby ZIP codes inviting them to Easter services. We need money for this mailing.
- Parish visits are going well.
- Lutheran Family Services: It was moved and seconded that we give \$2,000 to help support a volunteer for a year to work with refugee clients. Approved.

Father Don Sutton's Report

- Food Bridge Proposal Handout from Marin Toscano discussed. What, if any, is the relationship between this program and the Homeless and Hungry Task Force? We will ask Ms. Toscano to come at the end of our council retreat on February 9 to answer any questions before Council decides on this project.
- Parking Lot at 16th and Logan. Father Don would like to explore the possibility of acquiring that lot for St. Paul.

Treasurer's Report

- Aaron spoke of a recent \$20,000 bequest to St. Paul, half of which would go into the



general fund and half into a program similar to LAM (Lutheran Assistance Ministry.) It was moved and seconded that the entire bequest of \$20,000 not be spent in this current fiscal year. Then, half would be set aside for the purpose of supporting a homeless ministry as near as possible to the goals and purpose of LAM. Passed.

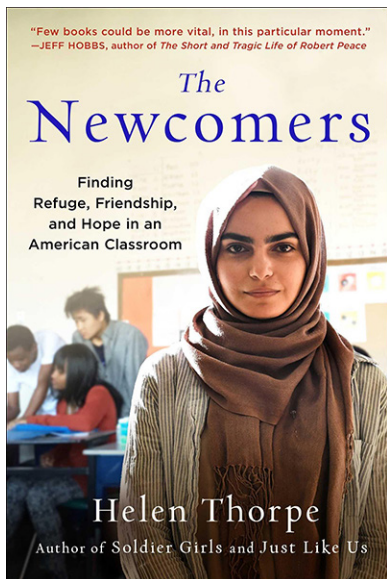
- Pledges are above expectation with 52.4% for the year so far, which is half a year. We are half way to the Facilities rental line in the budget but behind on parking and grocery cards.

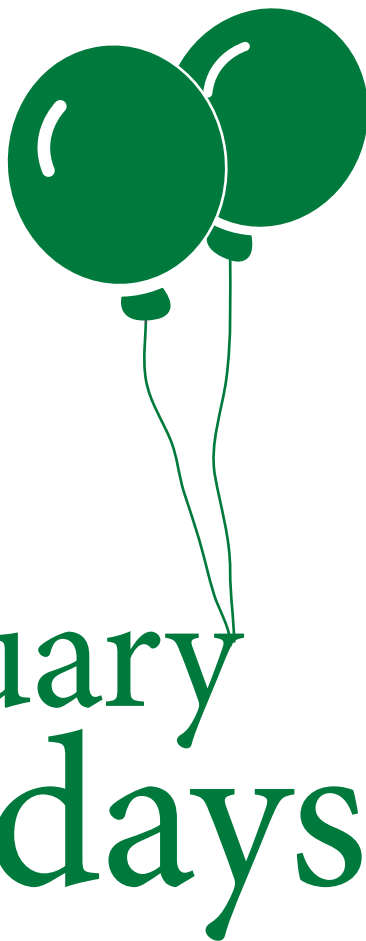
unfamiliar with American culture, they face the enormous challenge of adapting to life in the developed world, in addition to navigating the usual pangs of adolescence."

See a World Premiere Play by a Brilliant Writer

In early March, we will see **The Whistleblower**, a world premiere play by Itamar Moses, author of *The Band's Visit*, which received ten 2018 Tony awards. Itamar Moses is an absolutely brilliant playwright.

This play is hilarious, thought-provoking and really kind of a spiritual journey. When the main character recognizes that there is a discord between his inner self and his authentic self, he begins telling the truth about the relationships in his life, and the people around him think that he has lost his mind. He comes to a place that you will think is very hopeful at the end. The playwright takes us on a humorous exploration of our purpose and whether our actions have the power to affect others.
