Pastor's Update for September

The Transition Team and the Council have not been able to meet with our facilitator regarding Mission and Vision statements so we have nothing to share with the congregation. As a result the August 27 meeting was cancelled, and we will move the discussion to the already planned September 10th meeting.

We still have tasks, and most of them are getting done in small groups and/or the office.

Potluck: We are invited to Our Savior's, 915 E 9th, along with Messiah for the last of our "get-to-know" you potlucks on September 17 at noon, or as soon as we can get over there. They are changing the format a bit. They are asking that we all help stuff 25 or so bags with items for the homeless, and they are inviting their neighborhood. It should be an interesting day. Our Savior's is appealing for small donations of packaged ready-to-eat foods, small flashlights and batteries, single packets of tuna, peanut butter or cheese crackers, single-serve cups of cereal, fruit, gelatin, dried fruits, soups in cups, tissues, other supplies, and perhaps bus tokens or small grocery cards. Hope to see you all there with your goodies.

Directory: We need a new one! So, first, if you have changed your address, phone or email please call the office or send an email. Second, beginning Sept. 9 and 10 there will be a binder with our current information on you at the back of the Nave. We would ask that everyone check their information and correct if necessary. Finally, we will need a few people to make phone calls/email requests for those who haven't given us current information.

Prayer Vine: We have had very few people sign up so we are asking again. There is a signup in the back of the church, but you could also email or call if you are willing to participate in this important ministry.


MOVIE SCREENING

From the Council President

Much is happening behind the scenes

The Council continues to do the work of the church with many "behind the scenes" projects underway. Here are updates on a few of them:

Technology: We had a scare recently when it appeared the computer server had crashed and died. It did, however, provide an opportunity to review our entire technology situation and make some changes. We hired a consultant who evaluated what we had, how it was managed, and how we could make changes to enhance performance and lower costs. The server has been resurrected and restored – it hadn't really died! We created a "St. Paul Technology Umbrella," which allows the church to control all aspects of our electronic life. The website and alternate addresses now reside under the "umbrella" along with other parts, including G-Suite (our email). We are updating our phone system (and reducing the cost). We upgraded our internet service, which greatly improves wifi performance. What originally appeared to be a disaster has provided the opportunity to create a highly effective "umbrella" that should serve us well in the years to come.

Financial Audit: Joe Roderick has offered to put together a team to audit our financial life from January 1 through June 30, 2017. Currently, documentation is being collected for the auditors. A completed audit report will be done early this fall.

HVAC: A state-of-the-art system was put in place during the last renovation of the building. Yet, we arrive at church and there is no air conditioning! Frank Gunn has offered to work with our contractors to determine what is creating our problems, remedy them, and work with the Council to create an operational manual for the system. Frank is also evaluating our maintenance contract and pursuing other monthly maintenance options to improve performance and reduce costs.

Sound System: We have been blessed with a nave that produces some of the highest quality acoustics for musical performances. The same acoustics terrorize those who speak in the very same space. It seems we update each decade or so as sound

system technology improves. It is time to take another look! Pastor Penni has taken on this project. We have contracted with a company to "tweak" the equipment we have without changing or adding anything new to keep the cost down. We should see improvement soon. A special thank you to the Foundation for financing this project.

Communications Wall: One of the topics that came through loud and clear in our recent congregational conversations is that we aren't very good at communicating with one another. A display is being created in the west wall of the West Room to help us out. It offers a "one-stop" location to review all aspects of the life of our Church. Here you will find Council and committee reports, financial reports, audit reports, a comment card box (give your opinion or ask a question), a maintenance comment box (fill out a work order), a "thank you" pad (recognize someone's special work), a who's who photo wall, updates on the ECC transition, along with copies of many items to take home and review, and plenty more. Keep an eye on the wall as it evolves in the months ahead.

Call Committee: Soon there will be applications available for those interested in serving on the Call Committee. Watch the communications wall.

Constitution updates: Pastor Penni will work with a small group to review and update the Church's constitution. Proposals will be presented for discussion and ratification at the next congregational meeting this winter.

Committees: The goal of the Council is always to work through its committees to do the work of the Church. A laser focused effort will soon be underway to revive the committee structure and "staff" each committee with able and willing worker bees! We will be making personal invitations to those around us to be a part of the action! Don't be surprised when someone asks you to be a part of a committee – or beat us to the punch and volunteer!

All of this and much more is moving ahead through the work of the Council. More details to come!

Computer and sound issues to be addressed

Staff and officer reports:

Pastor Penni Walsh

- Transition Team decided to move the mission and vision work to small groups and perhaps work with a marketing group. The team may be ready to present their findings at an August 27th congregational meeting.
- The Beer, Brats, and Luther Evening was very successful with about 50 people from three churches participating. Thanks to everyone who helped.
- Evangelism / Outreach team has taken off. The Volunteer Fair is September 9 and everyone is encouraged to participate or drop by and offer support.
- Our local Denver Police officer is helping us keep people off our roof, which is being destroyed and which will need very costly repairs. Drugs and needles are always a problem.
- October 15th is the Rock and Roll Marathon.
 We are continuing our tradition of worshiping together on Saturday evening, October 14th.
- Then on October 29, Reformation Sunday, we will again worship together, this time on Sunday morning. There will be a concert at St. Paul with the AGO at 4:00 and another concert at Augustana at 4:00 also.

Father Don's Report:

 The Ecumenical Catholic Community (ECC) at St. Paul is becoming a reality. The Catholic Community needs to be incorporated separately and will need a constitution, which they are working on. There is now a Board with five members headed by Greg Yonkers. We also need an umbrella for both of our communities to shelter under.

- Music on Saturday evenings. Stephanie and Abraham will leave us on August 26th. There will be a wine and cheese reception to thank them for their service over the years to the Catholic Mass. Cheryl and Dan Kapsack have volunteered to provide music when they can; otherwise, Mark will play on Saturday evenings.
- The ECC Vicar (Father Michael) of our region is joining us on Reformation Sunday and again at the Labor Day Volunteer Appreciation Potluck Picnic.

Treasurer's Report: In July, the budget was overspent. Some of this shortfall may be due to summer vacations, when giving is typically below normal.

Evangelism / Outreach Report:

- A new form for upcoming events, projects, and expenditures will now be available to everyone on our website. Forms must be filled out and sent to the church office and to Jeff Parrott before any work is done or any plans are made.
- Transition Team has requested advertising money for signs and notices in the papers.
 The Evangelism budget includes money for advertising and promotion of our church.
- Prayer Vine Ministry is signing people up who are interested in praying as teams for people who request it. A sign-up sheet is in the back of the church.
- The Newborns in Need project with Our Savior and Messiah will be postponed till November instead of October. Maryann will apply for a Thrivent Action Team.
- Volunteer Fair is being advertised in Next Door, Life on Capitol Hill, etc. for \$290. Thanks to Anna and Joe Hanel for their work on this project. Anna received a Thrivent Action Team for this event.
- Littering for the Lord, putting postcards at local businesses, etc. is a possibility.


October

\$6,000 to optimize our sound system. Passed.




Book Talk
