Pastor's Updates

December 1 marked my one year anniversary with you. It has been a wonderful year for me and I'm hoping a meaningful year for all of St. Paul. I think it's a good time to look at what has been done as we prepare for what needs to be done.

An interim time has several developmental tasks:

1. Coming to terms with history: We did this in the early spring highlighting some of St. Paul's very successful history and acknowledging some painful past which was reexamined, opening the door for some healing to begin. We also come to terms with the real situation of the church's finances, making some very difficult decisions for the sake of a healthy future.

2. Discovering a new identity: We are still moving into this, but we know a lot more about who we are today. We have deepened our commitment to our ecumenical life together, and the Catholic community has also reexamined its identity and it moving toward a new future. We've also reached out to several other faith communities and continue exploring ways we can be church together. The whole community is very clear about its commitment to social justice and in that context being a deeply sacramental community grounded in strong liturgical worship.

3. Managing shifts in leadership: We are seeking to put into place systems that empower the lay leadership of the church and provide sensible processes for the life of the church. St. Paul has had a habit of allowing members to operate as "lone rangers" — for one or two people to take an idea and just do it without processing it through the decision making process, leaving some hurt or angry. When we

do this the relationships with the congregation are damaged, harming the whole community. It's going to take time and a real commitment on everyone's part to change this pattern.

4. Strengthening our sense of being church

together: This St. Paul has not had much of a problem with. There has been some distrust of the Office of the Bishop, but we've worked through this. And there has always been a commitment to ecumenical relationships. This is one of St. Paul's deep strengths.

5. Committing to a new future and a new leadership:

This will be the work of the Call Committee and of course the whole congregation. We are ready to move into this time, and I hope you are as excited about what is to come as I am.

Can we serve our immigrant neighbor by serving as a Sanctuary Church?

We will have three opportunities to hear from the Denver Sanctuary Coalition about what it takes

in space, people resources and finances to make this happen at St. Paul.

Please try and be at one of these events to learn about the history of sanctuary, why we do it and the theology behind civil disobedience.

The Gift Shopping event will be held at Crawford Elementary School, (16th & Florence Street in Aurora). Volunteers will be needed for shifts on Saturday, December 16 between 8:30 a.m.-4 p.m., and on Sunday December 17th between 8:30 a.m. - 1 p.m. It would be ideal if folks could volunteer for at least a two-hour period.

Each client will receive a slip of paper when they arrive with the ages/genders of their family members and the volunteer will help them navigate the tables with gifts for those ages/ genders. Nationwide showing of The Sultan and the Saint

The Sultan and Saint tells one of the great, lost stories from history set in a period of East-West conflict. It is the story of two men of faith searching for common understanding and peace during the time known as the Crusades: Francis of Assisi and the Sultan of Egypt. The meeting of these two men changed history and their story could not be more timely.

The film not only reenacts the story of Francis of Assisi and the Sultan, it also includes interviews with Muslim and Franciscan scholars, historians and even a neuroscientist who speaks to the positive effects of reconciliation and peacemaking on the human brain! The film is narrated by Jeremy Irons.

Unity Productions Foundation (UPF) released The Sultan and the Saint in 2016. UPF is a nonprofit organization dedicated to countering bigotry and creating peace through the media. They produce films aimed at increasing understanding among people of different faiths and cultures, especially among Muslims and other faiths. Over the past year, The Sultan and the Saint has premiered around the country and now it will be broadcast on PBS on Tuesday evening December 26. The Franciscan Action Network — a U.S. organization of religious and lay Franciscans — and UPF have joined together to promote film viewing parties around the country.

Hosts can register their viewing party and receive materials to help facilitate discussion after the film. I am working with a Muslim friend to organize a viewing party in the Denver area and you are invited to attend! Perhaps others from the St. Paul community would also like to host a viewing party.


